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"Let There Be Light" Haiti Mission Trip Installs Solar Panels

Almost 2 billion people on the planet have no access to electric power. In an effort to provide solar-powered electrical systems to those in need, "Solar Under the Sun" (SUS) was established as an ecumenical mission ministry of the Synod of the Sun, PCUSA. First Pres began a partnership with SUS last year, and several FPC members have been trained by SUS to perform site surveys and develop covenant relationships with in-country partners, while others have received technical training on how to design and install these systems.

After completing a site survey in January of this year, four FPC members (Craig Becker, Jimmy DeFoor, Ben Osborne and Ralph Reece), along with SUS instructor Sally Smith, journeyed to Haiti for seven days in early April to install a solar power system for a high school located in the small mountainous village of Cherident. This 10-room school, which is four hours by car from Port-au-Prince, was just recently rebuilt with support from the Haiti Education Foundation, after having been destroyed in the 2010 earthquake. Extensive planning was necessary to complete the system design prior to the trip, and decisions had to be made regarding which components could be purchased in-country, and what pieces would have to be packed and flown into Haiti with us.

Upon arriving at the school on Tuesday, the team was both surprised and pleased to find 15 people ready, willing and able to lend a hand! As a result, tremendous progress was made during the first two days. Electric lights and outlets were installed in every classroom, along with two outdoor security lights. Additionally, 14 outlets were installed in the 'computer lab' to provide power for laptops that will soon be purchased.

There was an unexpected 'bump in the road' later in the week when we discovered that a key part was missing. However, our incountry partners, Lucson and Herns, provided outstanding support, and after much searching they obtained the part in Port-au-Prince within 24 hours. The part was then installed and Voila! – Let There Be Light! The system worked perfectly, just as designed!

A short training class was then held on Saturday to teach the local operators how to maintain the system. The next day we all attended the local Episcopal church service, then the entire congregation walked the short distance across the road to bless the school and the new power system.

At first, it seemed that we would finish the project early, especially with all the unexpected help we received. Then it appeared that we would not finish at all, when a key part was discovered missing. Ultimately however, with the help of all our Haitian partners (and a dose of Divine Providence), we finished right on time! Thanks be to God!

PASTORS' LETTER

Dear Friends,

Answer this question. Answer quickly. Don't overthink it.

Would you rather belong to a church rich in tradition, or a church rich in freshness, belong to an old church, or a new church?

I can understand people choosing either.

Some people love belonging to a church just getting started, love being in on the ground floor. It's exciting to envision new traditions, to kickstart fresh relationships, to invent new rituals. Since 1998 Christians have started 50,000 new congregations in the United States. People love novel things.

Other people prefer congregations with histories. They relish ritual with roots, long nurtured relationships, and the rhythms of time-tested traditions.

I understand both impulses, but my heart belongs to history. My spirit delights in religious practices shared with our ancestors.

Our congregation's roots were planted in 1873 when a group of Presbyterians began worshipping above a Fort Worth livery stable. Soon, a congregation was officially chartered. Another Presbyterian congregation was chartered not long after. Buildings were built, but not too many years passed before these congregations joined together in one building, with one name.

This means that our congregation is 145 years old. To commemorate the anniversary, and to celebrate God's work throughout our past, we have commissioned a beautiful book to tell our congregation's story. 240 pages long, hardbound, and with lots of photographs, sidebars, and memories, this book will be a great read and a family keepsake. In fact, the Session is providing a copy to every First Pres family. I'll keep you up to date with our progress, but for the moment please know that the History Committee is hard at work, coordinating efforts and details with our author and layout/design artist.

The Committee faced a recent decision; should the book cover our history up to the year 2000, or should it carry forward to the present? In search of a good answer, the Committee wondered what percentage of our members have joined since 2000?

Some will be surprised by the answer. 63% of our members have joined First Pres in the last 18 years. (Our book of history will cover our history up to the present.)

So, back to our question; would you rather belong to a church rich in tradition, or a church rich in freshness, belong to an old church, or to a new church?

Maybe the choice isn't an either/or question, an A or B conundrum. Perhaps there is a way to inherit from a glorious past the values and practices necessary to forge a vibrant and creative future.

When I was a kid my mother had one of those inspirational sayings engraved on a wall mounted plaque. It read, "There are two things we should give our children: one is roots, and the other is wings."

What's true of our parents is true also of the Church of Jesus Christ.

I rejoice that at First Pres, we claim a storied 145-year history of Christian faithfulness, and also that we are a modern, forward looking family of faith.

History or freshness? Tradition or innovation?

At First Pres, we have both. Thanks be to God.
